



1. Program description

Local Para Champions (LPC) is an Australian Government initiative designed to provide financial assistance for participants aged 12 to 24 attending an eligible state/territory, national or international championships, where the championship is specifically for athletes with a disability.

The Australian Government recognises that junior sportspeople, and their families, find it difficult to meet ongoing costs associated with participating in state/territory, national and international sporting championships. The LPC program aims to support these junior sportspeople to participate in eligible sporting championships and reduce the financial burden on families involved in these competitions.

In addition to athletes with disability, the LPC program supports coaches, officials and other distinct support roles, such as guides and assistants who enable the sportsperson to participate.

The objectives of the LPC program are to:

- provide financial support to junior sportspeople to assist with the costs associated with competing in events for athletes with a disability at the elite or sub elite level
- provide financial support to families so that financial considerations are not a barrier for junior sportspeople to continue participating in sport
- acknowledge the importance of support staff that enable and enhance the experience of participation for junior athletes with a disability



1.1 Introduction

These guidelines contain information for the 2025/26 LPC grants. Applicants should thoroughly read these guidelines before filling out an application.

This document sets out:

- the purpose of the LPC program
- the eligibility criteria
- how grant applications are considered and selected
- how grantees are notified and receive grant payments
- how grantees will be monitored and evaluated
- responsibilities and expectations in relation to the LPC program.

This grant program and process will be administered by the ASC's Sport Programs and Grants teams.



2. Application process

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The grant program opens 1 May 2025 (Round 1), 1 August 2025 (Round 2), 1 November 2025 (Round 3), 1 February 2026 (Round 4).

The grant guidelines will be published on the ASC's Grants and Funding website.



Check eligibility

To be considered for a grant, it is important applicants check the eligibility criteria before submitting an application – refer to section 4.1



Grants close on 31 July 2025 (Round 1), 31 October 2025 (Round 2), 31 January 2026 (Round 3), 30 April 2026 (Round 4).

Complete the application form and address all eligibility and assessment criteria to be considered for a grant.



Eligibility check

We will assess applications against the eligibility criteria. Applications that do not meet the eligibility criteria will not progress to further assessment. You will be notified if ineligible.



Assessment

Grant applications will be assessed against the assessment criteria and shortlisted for approval.



Approval

The Director of Sport Programs will approve the recommended applications



Notification of outcome

Applicants will be notified via email of the outcome of their application.



Payments

Grant payments will be made to successful applicants.



Grant reporting

Applicants may be required to complete an audit, including providing evidence of expenditure e.g. tax invoices, receipts.



3. Grant amount and grant period

3.1 Grants available

In 2025/26, a total of \$500,000 (GST excl.) will be available with \$1,000 (GST excl.) the maximum funding amount available per grant.

If successful, applicants will receive between \$750 and \$1000 towards the cost of attending their nominated championships.

- Base Grant: **\$750**
- Applicants travelling 800km 1999km to their nominated championships: + \$100
- Applicants travelling internationally or greater than 2,000km to their nominated championships: +
 \$200
- Applicants residing in a rural electorate: + **\$50**

Notification of outcome	Applicants will be notified of the outcome of their application within six weeks after round closing date.

4. Eligibility criteria

4.1 Who is eligible to apply for a grant?

To be eligible to receive funding through the LPC program, applicants must satisfy the following eligibility criteria:

- Be turning 12 to 24 years of age in the same calendar year as the nominated championships.
- Be an Australian citizen or have been granted permanent resident status and be residing in Australia.
- Be a participant in an event, division or competition open only to athletes with a disability which is:



- an official state/territory championships endorsed by the relevant ASC recognised national sporting organisation (NSO), national sporting organisation for people with disability (NSOD) or a School Sport Australia member body; or
- an official national championship endorsed by the relevant ASC recognised NSO, NSOD or School Sport Australia; or
- an international competition, where only athletes with a disability can be selected, as a member of an official Australian team representing an ASC recognised NSO, NSOD or School Sport Australia.

A participant is anyone involved in an official capacity in the event or competition such as an athlete, coach or official, and where appropriate, guides or assistants.

- Applicants attending a state/territory championship must be living more than 125km from the championships venue and travelling greater than 250km return to participate in the nominated championships*.
- May receive a maximum of two grants in the same allocation year (1 May 2025 30 April 2026) for attending either:
 - \circ $\,$ one state or national championships and one international competition; or
 - two different international competitions.
- Must incur out-of-pocket expenses equal to, or greater than, the grant amount they are eligible to receive.
- Must not receive a Local Para Champions grant or a Local Sporting Champions grant in the same or a previous round to attend the same championship or competition.
- Applications must be submitted within timeframes indicated in the 'When can I apply?' section of this document.

*People attending a national championships or international competition do not need to be travelling a minimum distance to be eligible.

4.2 What competitions are eligible?

The following are examples of eligible championships:

- An official state/territory championship where the event, a division or competition is open only to athletes with a disability and it is endorsed by the relevant ASC recognised national sporting organisation (NSO), national sporting organisations for people with disability (NSODs) or a School Sport Australia member body:
 - e.g. Special Olympics NSW State Equestrian Championships
 - e.g. attending the QLD School Sport Swimming 13-19 years State Championships in a Multi Class event.
- An official national championship where the event, a division or the competition is open to only athletes with a disability and endorsed by the relevant ASC recognised NSO, NSOD or School Sport Australia:
 - o e.g. Basketball Australia Ivor Burge Championships or Kevin Coombs Cup
 - o e.g. Australian National Goalball Championships.
- Attending an international competition as a member of an Australian team, where only athletes with a
 disability can be selected and you are representing an ASC recognised NSO, NSOD or School Sport
 Australia:
 - e.g. attending the Boccia World Championships as part of the Boccia Australia team.
 - e.g. attending the Wheelchair Rugby World Championships as part of the Wheelchair Rugby Australian team.



4.3 What competitions are not eligible?

Applicants for participation in the following are **not** eligible:

- Any competition/division or individual event where that competition/division/event is not specifically for athletes with a disability, such as attending the NSW All Schools Cross Country which is open to any athlete that is able bodied or has a disability.
- A club team attending an international competition or travelling overseas.
- A state sporting team attending an international competition or travelling overseas.
- Development or training squads and camps.
- Ongoing seasonal competitions.
- Local and regional competitions.
- Competitions delivered by organisations not affiliated with an ASC recognised NSO or NSOD.
- Competitions delivered by associations not affiliated with School Sport Australia.

5. What the grant money can be used for

5.1 Eligible expenditure

If successful, you can use the grant on any associated cost for you to attend the nominated championships.

Examples of expenses which are eligible include, but are not limited to:

- competition registration/entry fees/levies
- transport costs (e.g. airfares, petrol)
- accommodation
- transport and accommodation costs for parents/guardians can be accepted where the parent/guardian must attend the championship
- uniform

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• sporting equipment

5.2 What the grant money cannot be used for

Examples of expenses which are ineligible include, but are not limited to:

- costs to attend any selection trial for the approved championship
- costs to attend training for the approved championship
- costs not associated with attending the approved championship



6. The assessment criteria

All applications will initially be assessed by the ASC against the eligibility criteria.

If applications exceed the level of available funding, eligible applications will proceed to assessment by the ASC against the selection criteria as follows.

Eligible applications will be assessed and grants will be allocated, on a local area basis to facilitate a geographic spread of funding based on the overall number of applications received and the number of grants available.

Applications within a local area will be ranked in order of priority for funding, by applying each of the following criteria in order:

- 1. Applicants with a disability Applicants with a disability will be prioritised above able-bodied applicants.
- 2. Level of competition International events will be prioritised above National events and National events will be prioritised above State events.
- 3. Distance travelled Applicants required to travel a greater distance to their competition will be prioritised. Special consideration may apply to applicants from the same local area who are attending the same competition.

Special consideration may apply to applicants from the same local area who are attending the same competition or those attending a competition travelling more than 3,000kms.

7. How to apply

To apply, you must submit an online <u>application form</u> and provide all requested information to ensure your application can be assessed.

If you are under 18 years of age you must obtain the agreement of your parent or guardian to submit an application, these Program Guidelines and the terms and conditions prior to submitting an application.

To complete an application, you will need:

- your personal/contact details
- details of the championships and event you are attending
- for international events details of a contact (e.g. coach) from the recognised NSO/D or School Sport Australia to confirm your selection
- contact details of your parent(s)/guardian(s)
- personal bank account details for you or your parent(s)/guardian(s)

Applications are to be submitted:

- once you have been selected to attend the championships and your participation has been confirmed; and
- within the relevant round dependent on when the competition is being held.



Please ensure your application is complete and the information is accurate prior to submitting it. Giving false or misleading information is a serious offence under the *Criminal Code 1995* (Cth). The ASC will investigate information provided that is false or misleading and may not consider your application for a grant.

If you find an error in your application after submitting it, you should notify us immediately at <u>sportingchampions@ausport.gov.au</u>. **Please note the ASC may not accept any additional information**, **nor requests from you, to correct your application after applications have closed**.

If you have any technical difficulties using the system, please contact the ASC immediately at <u>sportingchampions@ausport.gov.au</u>. Please note, the ASC will not accept any late requests to assist with technical issues if the issue has not been reported to the ASC prior to the application closing time.

If you require further guidance with the application process, are unable to submit an online application or wish to withdraw a submitted application, please contact the LPC team at <u>sportingchampions@ausport.gov.au</u>.

7.1 When can I apply?

Applications can be submitted at any time during the round opening and closing dates for competitions that occur within the relevant timeframes below:

Round	Eligible competition dates (Eligible competitions must have at least one day of competition during this timeframe)
Round 1 (Applications open May-July 2025)	Eligible competitions held between 1 April 2025 and 30 November 2025
Round 2 (Applications open August- October 2025)	Eligible competitions held between 1 July 2025 and 28 February 2026
Round 3 (Applications open November 2025-January 2026)	Eligible competitions held between 1 October 2025 and 30 May 2026
Round 4 (Applications open February-April 2026)	Eligible competitions held between 1 January 2026 and 31 August 2026

Applications for competitions held during the eligible competition dates can be submitted at any time during the round.



8. Grant approval

8.1 Who will approve grants?

The 'Grant Approver' for the LPC program is the ASC's Director of Sport Programs. They will make the final decision as to the grant recipients and funding amounts, after considering the recommendations from the assessment process and the availability of grant funds for the purpose of the LPC program.

Please note that anticipated high demand and the limited total funding available for the LPC program may see unsuccessful applications through the grant approval process.

The grant approver's decision is final in all matters, including:

- the approval of the grant
- the grant funding amount to be awarded
- the terms and conditions of the grant.

There is no appeal mechanism for decisions to approve or not approve a grant.

9. Notification of application outcomes

If successful, you will be notified of the outcome by the ASC and potentially your local Federal Member of Parliament. The ASC will advise you of any special conditions attached to the grant including terms and conditions and timeframes for payment.

If unsuccessful, you will be notified via email by the ASC.

10. Successful grant applications

10.1 How we pay the grant

Grants will be paid into the bank account supplied in the application

11. Announcement of grants

If successful, your grant will be listed on the ASC website no later than twenty-one calendar days after the date of effect.



12. How we monitor your grant activity

If successful, you may be asked to provide evidence of the use and expenditure of the approved grant through an audit process. Successful applicants will be contacted by the ASC if they have been selected for an audit and will be required to submit appropriate documentation including receipts for expenditure of the grant. The ASC may request evidence of expenditure up to two years after receiving the grant.

13. Probity

The Australian Government will make sure that the grant opportunity process is fair, is conducted according to the published grant opportunity guidelines, incorporates appropriate safeguards against fraud and corruption, unlawful activities and other inappropriate conduct and is consistent with the Commonwealth Grant Rules and Principles.

Applicants should be aware of their obligations under the National Anti-Corruption Commission Act 2022, noting that under the Act grantees will generally be considered 'contracted service providers' [see https://www.nacc.gov.au/resource-centre/nacc-fact-sheets].

13.1 Enquiries and feedback

The ASC welcomes your feedback and complaints. All complaints about a grant process must be provided in writing.

Any questions you have about grant decisions for this grant program should be submitted online to <u>Feedback and Complaints | Australian Sports Commission</u>.

If you do not agree with the way the ASC has handled your complaint, you may complain to the Commonwealth Ombudsman. The Ombudsman will not usually consider a complaint unless the matter has first been raised directly with the ASC.

13.2 How the ASC will use your information

As the LPC program is funded by the Australian Government, the ASC may share your information with your local Member of Parliament and/or their representatives, and with other government agencies for a relevant Australian Government purpose, such as (but not limited to):

- improving the effective administration, monitoring and evaluation of Australian Government programs;
- research, and
- announcing grant recipients.



13.3 Treatment of confidential information

The ASC will treat the information provided by applicants as confidential if it meets all conditions below:

- It is clearly identified as confidential with an explanation as to why it should be treated as confidential.
- The information is commercially sensitive.
- Disclosing the information would cause unreasonable harm to you or someone else.

13.4 When we may disclose confidential information

The ASC may disclose confidential information to:

- the ASC Board and/or our employees and contractors, (and to other Commonwealth employees and contractors as required) to help us manage the grant program effectively.
- the ASC Board and/or our employees and contractors (and to other Commonwealth employees and contractors as required) so we can research, assess, monitor, and analyse our programs and activities.
- the Minister or Parliamentary Secretary.
- the Auditor-General, Ombudsman or Privacy Commissioner.
- a House or Committee of the Australian Parliament.

The ASC may also disclose confidential information if required or authorised by law, or if someone other than the ASC has made the confidential information public.

13.5 Conflict of interest

Any conflicts of interest, or perceived conflicts of interest can affect the performance of the grant opportunity or program. There may be a conflict of interest, or perceived conflict of interest, if ASC staff, any member of a committee or advisor and/or you or any of your personnel, including sub-contractors:

- have a professional, commercial or personal relationship with a party who can influence the application selection process, such as an Australian Government officer [or member of an external panel]
- have a relationship with or interest in, an organisation, which is likely to interfere with or restrict the applicants from carrying out the proposed activities fairly and independently or
- have a relationship with, or interest in, an organisation from which they will receive personal gain because the organisation receives a grant under the grant program/ grant opportunity.

You will be asked to declare, as part of your application, any perceived or existing conflicts of interests or that, to the best of your knowledge, there are no conflicts of interest.

If you later identify an actual, apparent, or perceived conflict of interest, you must inform the ASC in writing immediately.

Conflicts of interest for Australian Government staff will be handled as set out in the Australian Public Service Code of Conduct (Section 13(7) of the Public Service Act 1999). Committee members and other officials including the decision maker must also declare any conflicts of interest.

13.6 Privacy

The ASC treats your personal information according to the Privacy Act 1988 and the Australian Privacy Principles. This includes letting you know:



- what personal information we collect
- why we collect your personal information
- who we give your personal information to.

Your personal information can only be disclosed to someone else for the primary purpose for which it was collected, unless an exemption applies.

As part of your application, you declare your ability to comply with the Privacy Act 1988 and the Australian Privacy Principles and your intention to impose the same privacy obligations on officers, employees, agents and subcontractors that you engage to assist with the activity, in respect of personal information you collect, use, store, or disclose in connection with the activity. Accordingly, you must not do anything, which if done by the ASC would breach an Australian Privacy Principle as defined in the Act.

13.7 Freedom of information

All documents in the possession of the Australian Government, including those about this grant opportunity, are subject to the Freedom of Information Act 1982 (FOI Act).

The purpose of the FOI Act is to give members of the public rights of access to information held by the Australian Government and its entities. Under the FOI Act, members of the public can seek access to documents held by the Australian Government. This right of access is limited only by the exceptions and exemptions necessary to protect essential public interests and private and business affairs of persons in respect of whom the information relates.
